We as humans may not always understand God's plan for the time in our lives, but as you read, we hope you will discover that your entire life has been "All in His Time!"

Thank you for taking this journey of faith with us. We pray that you will be blessed in your time with God each day of Lent through these scriptures and daily devotions.

February 14, 2024 Ash Wednesday

WHO ARE WE?

The Lord saw that the wickedness of man was great in the earth; and that every intention of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually. Genesis 6:5 (ESV)

One year in my teaching career our administration had us fill out a survey to see if we had a growth mindset. One of the questions on the survey was: "Do you believe that all people are basically good?" This question gave me pause, because I knew that I wanted to have a positive viewpoint toward my students and colleagues, but knew in my heart that all people are not basically good. We are all on the same level having been born and conceived in sin. "I am a good person" is what I commonly have heard people say. This common belief in our culture today is completely contrary to what God tells us about ourselves in Scripture:

"All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." Romans 3:23 (ESV)

"We have all become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like filthy rags." Isaiah 64:6 (ESV)

Becoming aware of our own sinfulness is essential to our salvation! We are created in God's image and He loves His creation. But this awareness of our sinfulness should drive us humbly to our knees and fill our hearts with thankfulness for His sacrifice of Jesus, His Son. Because of God's holiness He cannot stand sin. Because of His great love for us, He provides a substitute sacrifice to pay for our sins. This Lent, let us reflect on our sinful condition, confess it and then joyfully and gratefully know in our hearts who we are because of God's great love for us!

Prayer: Dear God in heaven, we are not enough, but You are! We are broken, but You are good! Help us not want to please ourselves, but to imitate You! Cleanse us of our sin and enable us to love You with all our hearts, souls, and strength! Amen.

SAFE AND SECURE

The Lord is a refuge for the oppressed, a stronghold in times of trouble. Psalm 9:9 (NIV)

Psalm 9 was written by King David after a successful victory over his enemies. In various translations, refuge is also called shelter, fortress, defense, and high tower. The Hebrew word means a high, safe place, inaccessible to the enemy.

When I visited the Luther lands years ago, I was able to tour the Wartburg Castle, where Luther fled for safety, took on the name "Junker Jorg" and translated the New Testament. It is a beautiful fortress on a precipice of 410 meters. The words of Luther's famous hymn, "A Mighty Fortress" really resonated with me, as I pictured him in this sanctuary, safe from those who sought to kill him.

Times of trouble? They are well known to us in 2024, as we think about serious illnesses, death, job loss, financial worries, family confrontations, and so forth. Daily, on the news, we are bombarded with war and its effects, as well as natural disasters. This verse reminds us that God is our safe space, His presence is sure, He is worth trusting, and He will not abandon us. We can go to Him at all times, as well as times of calamity. When we are weary from the fight against the devil, the world, and our flesh, God offers us rest and safety.

Another "refuge "Luther fled to, about ten years later, was Coburg Castle. He was banned from the empire so was not able to go to Augsburg with the delegation from Saxony. This fortress was used in countless military conflicts. I visited the Luther room and there is a writing on the wall which he scratched in Latin. It is Psalm 118:17: "I shall not die but live, and declare the works of the Lord." May we not only find hope and refuge in the Lord in times of trouble, but, as Luther, use the times of challenge to witness even more boldly of God's great love in Jesus.

Prayer: Dear Lord, help us to come to You for comfort and guidance in times of trouble. Help us to trust Your will in all circumstances. Amen

KEEP THE FAITH!

My times are in your hand; Deliver me from the hand of my enemies, and from those who persecute me. Psalm 31:15 (KJV)

"When I find myself in times of trouble, mother Mary comes to me. Speaking words of wisdom, Let It Be." These are the opening words of Paul McCartney's <u>Let It Be</u>. When there was enormous strife within The Beatles in 1969, Paul had a dream that his mum came to him and assured him everything was going to work out.

In our text, David is experiencing stress, isolation and depression. He is in hiding from the persecution of Saul. Everyone has abandoned him, and flee for fear of their lives when he is around.

What do you do when you are stressed? Take a run? Workout? Take a bike ride? Take a pill? Have a drink? Eat? Withdraw from everyone? We try to fix the situation **by ourselves**. We think we know better than anyone on how to pick ourselves up, but we end up falling down again and again. We don't reach out for help, until it's too late. Our stress morphs into depression and we withdraw into our own minds. We may seek medical assistance or Dial 988 for help. Most often we go it alone. Why? **Our faith is weak.**

David is depressed. He's tired of being hunted. He's physically and emotionally drained. He's burnt out and ready to quit. So, what does he do? He calls out to God! He undeniably accepts that his life is totally in HIS hands, and not in his own. **He puts his trust in God.** Throughout Psalm 31, David acknowledges that God alone is in control of this life, and HE will sustain him as HE sees fit. Something we conveniently forget repeatedly.

When I find myself in times of trouble, God the Father waits for me, to remember HIS promises: Come unto Me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Matt 11:28 (KJV)

Prayer: Lord God Heavenly Father. Give us a faith like David's to call upon You in all our times of trouble, as You are always here with us. In Jesus' Name. Amen.

Last July, I completed a Bible app plan to read the entire book of Psalms along with Proverbs in a month's time. I decided to do the plan with encouragement from a friend who wanted to form a group to read each day and then comment about how the readings affected us, or what stood out or how we could apply that day's reading into our own life. What a joy it was to hear other people's perspectives each day. Their words were a blessing to me as they were encouraging about the love and strength of our God.

God wants us to have and experience a direct relationship with him. When we have that relationship, it seems easier to "sing" of His strength even when we are in a very difficult season of our lives. God is never far from us even when we may forget His presence.

How might your day start differently, if, before you set a foot on the floor, you would say a quick prayer of thanksgiving to a God whose love and faithfulness will never let you down.

Prayer: Gracious Heavenly Father, Thank you for being our refuge, our source of strength and unwavering faithfulness at all times, but especially in times of trouble. May we be bold to say it on a daily basis. Amen

A PERFECT SANDWICH

My goal in the days and weeks ahead is to keep God's trustworthiness as my foundation and end each day thanking God for the refuge He provides.

Prayer: Dear Lord, Help me to trust in You at all times, no matter what burdens are on my heart today. Thank you for being my refuge.

IS IT TIME TO EAT?

All creatures look to you to give them their food at the proper time. Psalm 104:27 (NIV)

I heard this question often when my children were growing up. Meal times were regularly scheduled, but snack times were whenever. HOW GOOD IS A TIMELY WORD

A person finds joy in giving an apt reply-and how good is a timely word. Proverbs 15:23 (NIV)

In this proverb, Soloman is encouraging us to give a timely, apt reply. Elsewhere in this chapter, an apt reply is emphasized: vs.1 a gentle answer turns away wrath, vs.4 the soothing tongue is a tree of life, vs.7 the lips of the wise spread knowledge, vs.28 the heart of the righteous weighs its answers.

Verse 23 is the only one in this section that emphasizes timing. The theme of our Lenten Devotional is "All in His Time". This verse reminds us to think of our timing. Maybe we have thought of the best response to say, but the timing is wrong so our reply may not be as beneficial as we hope.

So, as we think about timing, we could listen to our child, spouse, friend, or co-worker's whole story before we reply, so they know they have been heard. Before we respond on social media or after a disagreement, we could wait so that after reflection and time our response is appropriate. When a child, teen or student is struggling with a new skill, we could give them time to figure it out before we advise them. As God's timing is perfect, maybe we should consider our timing when speaking to others as well.

Prayer: Lord, help us as we interact with people to regulate our words and the timing of them to be a better reflection of You. In Jesus' name, Amen.

NO RANDOM TURNS

... a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted. Ecclesiastes 3:2 (ESV)

When I read the scripture verses of Ecclesiastes 3:1-8, it takes me back to the 1960's when as a little girl I would put my 45 single on the turntable and listen to these verses being sung in "Turn! Turn! Turn!" by the band, The Byrds. The song's theme, "a time to be born, a time to die; a time to plant, a time to reap," is a reminder of the impermanence of life.

"A time to be born, a time to die" -- the timing of our coming into the world and going out of it—are fixed by God. It is appointed that they shall die; and particularly Christ, whose birth is at the time appointed by the Father, in the fullness of time; and whose life could not be taken away before his hour had come. In the book of Ecclesiastes, Solomon realizes that one cannot affect the timing of one's birth or death. It is a time that God alone has determined. Neither can he change the seasons of the earth. There is a planting season and a harvest season determined by God. The earth will "Turn! Turn! Turn!" Births and deaths will keep happening. Additionally, too often we try to reap during planting seasons and plant during harvest. God knows everything that will happen in our lives and His timing is never too early or too late.

While we struggle to discern His timing, we should be encouraged that God did not merely leave us to deduce his character and wisdom from nature. In Jesus, the Creator of all stepped into terrestrial time, into our frame of reference. In fully human form, He "dwelt among us" (John 1:14). God further displayed the marvelous wisdom of His timing when the time had come for the Son of Man to be glorified (John 12:23). Jesus obeyed his Father to the point of death, offering for all time a single sacrifice for our sins.

Prayer: Father, help us to trust your timing in working out the details in our lives. You make all things beautiful in your time, which counts for all eternity. Amen

A TIME FOR EVERYTHING

...a time to weep and a time to laugh; a time to mourn and a time to dance; Ecclesiastes 3:4 (ESV)

I was looking for an answer, direction, and encouragement, but was perplexed at what God was telling me in Ecclesiastes. What did it mean that there is a time for everything? Would my dad be healed here on earth? I wrestled with what God was telling me about my dad's condition. Then, a Hebrew peace-blessing song "Shalom My Friend" came to mind. Shalom means "made good" or "fully restored". My dad would have peace and wholeness, and I needed to trust God with all the details, in His timing.

Ecclesiastes 3:1-8 prepares us with wise advice: "there is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven;" Life has shown me there is "a time to weep and a time to laugh, a time to mourn and a time to dance." God is in control; He's with us always; He's sovereign; and He's holding our hand every step of the way. His plan is always best for our lives.

Prayer: Father God, Maker of heaven and earth, you alone are worthy of our worship and praise. Help us, Holy Spirit, and guide us for "there is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven". The song eloquently describes the various cycles of life's journey experiences. Each verse presents opposites, contrasting directions from North to South, tears to mending, and silence to shouting.

Today, we will focus on the two parts of verse 7.

Part one: An example of tearing and mending occurs at a funeral, symbolizing the loss of a loved one that leads to the building of stronger family bonds. Even during Barb's journey with cancer a few years ago, we witnessed the Lord sending numerous wonderful people—doctors, nurses, church family, friends, and even strangers—to support us during challenging times. Now, we find ourselves in a position to offer support to others on their cancer journeys at the Wellness House in Hinsdale.

Part two: There is a balance between silence and speech, emphasizing the importance of listening before speaking out. Our general instinct is to speak first, but wisdom lies in following the examples of Biblical leaders like Nehemiah, Timothy, and Paul, who paused to pray before acting or speaking. In today's age of instant communication through social media, everyone is eager to share their opinions and hit the send button without thinking. A common example is news outlets, often presenting snippets of a story mixed with opinions and presenting it as news.

Closing Prayer: Lord, grant us the wisdom in Ecclesiastes 3 to be better servants for and with You. Amen

A SIGN OF THE TIMES

"When evening comes, you say, 'It will be fair weather, for the sky is red,' and in the morning, 'Today it will be stormy, for the sky is red and overcast.' You know how to interpret the appearance of the sky, but you cannot interpret the signs of the times." Matthew 16:2-3 (NIV)

I have occasionally wondered how it might have been to live at the time that Jesus spent on earth, witnessing His miracles, seeing demons being exorcised, nature being tamed, and hearing him speak parables. There would be no reason to doubt that He was the Son of God and my faith could be much stronger. I might even have all my questions answered. Seeing is believing, they say.

But apparently that isn't true, as we see in this encounter with Jesus, the Pharisees and the Sadducees. They had come to Him to test his validity as the Messiah. If He would give them a sign from heaven, they might . . . believe? Jesus knew their hearts, calling them a wicked and adulterous generation. While they were quite able to forecast weather by seeing the signs in the sky, they were missing other signs pointing to Jesus as the Messiah, had they been open to receiving them. They weren't hard to find; these religious pros had long been observing Jesus as he conducted his ministry. If they had taken their study of the prophets more seriously, they might have realized that the prophesies converged on this very time for the coming of the Messiah, a time that God had appointed for it to happen, the "fullness of time."

They had not read the signs of the times, he accused them. Again, their thorough study of the Scriptures should have led them to seeing the Word point to the arrival of the Messiah. Daniel's prophetic writings, the ministry of John the Baptist, the speech of Simeon, among other things. They did not have a lack of evidence but instead were too stubborn to accept it as truth. Indeed, Jesus was not going to perform a sign just to humor them—because it simply would demean the miracle.

We must also be aware of the signs of our own times. The Messiah has already come, lived and sacrificed his life for us and then ascended into heaven where he is preparing for us. We do not know the day or the time in which He is expected, but we have been given signs to expect and told how to prepare for His second coming. With so much turmoil and misinformation and untrustworthy leadership around us, we need to remain in the Word of God and in prayer to keep us focused.

That burden would soon be directed at and against the disciples once Jesus was gone.

Prayer: Dear Heavenly Father, help us to always come to You for guidance when we need it. You have given us a look into eternity for those who follow Your Word and those who do not. Help us to take Your guidance to heart and follow it. Amen

KNOWING ONE'S DUTY VS. KNOWING GOD'S TIMING

"He said to them, 'It is not for you to know times or seasons that the Father has fixed by his own authority."—Acts 1:7 (ESV)

In a post-resurrection conversation with Jesus, his disciples asked if he was about to "restore the kingdom to Israel." His response in this passage informs them that they do not need such information to fulfill God's call on their lives. Rather, Jesus explains that they will soon receive power from the Holy Spirit and will need to turn their attention to serving as his "witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." In other words, they need to be mindful of, and attend to, their divinely-appointed duties and let God handle the rest.

One of my favorite historical examples of this type of vocational clarity occurred on May 19, 1780. On what became known as "New England's Dark Day," near complete darkness inexplicably enveloped the region from noon until the following day. In Connecticut, the Governor's Council was in session and the startling lack of light caused many council members to request adjournment so that they could be with their families during what they assumed was the imminent Final Judgment.

A devout councilman, Abraham Davenport, became famous for his response to his nervous colleagues when he stated the following: "I am against adjournment. The day of judgment is either approaching, or it is not. If it is not, there is no cause for an adjournment; if it is, I choose to be found doing my duty. I wish, therefore, that candles may be brought." And so they were, and the session continued.

My brothers and sisters, the consuming darkness of the world of 2024 is as unsettling as that experienced by our New England ancestors. It tempts us to "adjourn" into our private spaces and speculate on how long our Lord will tarry. But let us remember, we each are called to serve in "the one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church" and within our society. May we, indeed, press on in our own divinely-appointed tasks and "be found doing [our] dut[ies]."

The only thing is, God had not revealed WHEN the Christ would be born. He has not told us WHEN the End will be. We have to wait --- just like we're waiting for Him to send us a new Senior Pastor. WAITING CAN BE HARD! But don't get discouraged. HE KNOWS WHAT HE'S DOING!

We pray: "Lord, we need patience!" Like everything else, give it to us when You know best! Amen.

Therefore, do not pronounce judgment before the time, before the Lord comes, who will bring to light the things now hidden in darkness and will disclose the purposes of the heart. Then each one will receive his commendation from God. 1 Corinthians 4:5 (ESV)

In the Boy Scouts, when a scout was trying to move up in rank, he would sit with a Board of Review. This panel was composed of adult and scout aged leaders who were charged to ensure that all necessary steps had been completed to move into the next rank. One leader who sometimes sat on this Board always asked his favorite question, "What is the most important Scout Law?" The answers would vary, but if the scout did not pick the one this leader believed it to be, he would say, "Wrong!" and then try to explain why this was the only right answer. He judged and did not allow the scout to defend his reasoning. The leader, I felt, was the one who was "Wrong!" These events showed me how important it is in life to be patient, caring and understanding in hearing others' opinions and answers.

We should wait for the Lord's judgments, and not our own, for when He reveals "The purposes of the Heart", those answers will be right.

Prayer: Lord, Grant us patience to wait for Your true judgements and You reveal to us the purposes only You can perceive. In the redeeming grace of Jesus Christ we believe, Amen.

Growing up, when playing board games or ping pong with my father, he would use the title 'Champion of Champions.' We would decide to play one more game, and that person would be crowned The Champion. However, when the results did not swing his way, the new "Champion of Champions" title was suddenly employed. This was the true winner, the best of the best, and the final word. (I was sometimes crowned the Champion of Champions, but it wasn't easy.)

The world does not see God as the King of Kings and Lord of Lords, or the Champion of Champions, and we wonder if they ever will. The King of kings and Lord of lords is timeless, and His return will be timely!

DISCERNING EARS RATHER THAN ITCHING EARS

"For the time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions . . ."—2 Timothy 4:3 (ESV)

In this letter to Timothy, Paul warns of the proclivity of many of us to seek teachers who tell us what we want to hear, especially relating to matters of Christian doctrine. Paul notes that such persons "accumulate for themselves" these types of instructors. (The King James translation renders these words: "heap to themselves.") In other words, in an effort to bolster self-justification, sinful individuals seek multiple teachers to confirm their flawed judgments.

Unfortunately, we live in an era when finding an abundance of "experts" to validate sinful thoughts and behavior is all too easy. As Saint Paul forecast, enduring truth has fallen out of fashion.

In 1930, Fulton Sheen, radio preacher on NBC's *Catholic Hour*, observed that modern thinkers, both religious and secular, taught "with unbuttoned pride that there is no such thing as Truth with a capital 'T,' for Truth is ambulatory: we make it as we go; it depends on the Time in which we live." Somehow, Sheen added, people had forgotten that "Truth is not our making, but God's."

One of the ways that "ambulatory" truth is most noticeable is in our modern practice of decommissioning the term "sin" and downplaying or rationalizing its various manifestations. In a world in which fallen humans need to repent, the inclination to explain away violations of God's Law is perilous to souls and to society, the consequences of which were temporal <u>and</u> eternal. Fulton Sheen's fellow radio sermonizer, Walter Maier on *The Lutheran Hour*, noted (also in 1930): "You will find that the short, three-letter word **sin** has been deleted from many modern vocabularies and that short, three-word sentence 'I have sinned' is one of the hardest confessions to wring from proud human lips."

There's a difference between what we want to hear and what we need to hear. Sound teaching makes our sinfulness clear. Sound teaching also rescues us by pointing us to Jesus.

Prayer: Lord, I am a sinner. Help me to repent daily and trust in Your redeeming work, rather than deny the reality of my transgressions. Thank you for Your grace. Amen.

We may suffer no more than ridicule or rejection today for expressing our faith, but as the world becomes increasingly hostile to Christianity, we may be punished or imprisoned for acknowledging Christ. Whatever our future sufferings may be, we must never fail to declare that Jesus is our Savior and King. We claim this promise: "Everyone will hate you because of me. But if you remain faithful until the end, you will be saved" (Matthew 10:22).

We can rejoice as a church family that we are called to be Christ's faithful witnesses. It is our privilege to proclaim Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection as we celebrate Easter!

Our prayer: We thank you, Jesus, for Your great suffering on our behalf, for the salvation that You have brought to Your people.
